Scripture Romans 5:6-8

6 For while we were still helpless, at the right time, Christ died for the ungodly. 7 For rarely will someone die for a just person—though for a good person perhaps someone might even dare to die. 8 But God proves his own love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Christ's Commitment to Us

Romans 5:6-8

- Because of his love God left the comfort and glory of heaven to come to this planet to die for us.
- Romans 5:8 is agape, which carries the idea of commitment or sacrifice. Agape conveys action.
- God put into action to commitment by willingly dying for us.

Scripture

Romans 5:9-11

9 How much more then, since we have now been declared righteous by his blood, will we be saved through him from wrath. 10 For if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, then how much more, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. 11 And not only that, but we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received this reconciliation.

Christ's Commitment to Us

Romans 5:9-11

- We're declared righteous by Jesus' blood. "righteous" means "right standing" or "right conduct."
- We're saved from God's wrath. We don't like to think about God as wrathful, but when we get our minds around it, this actually helps us better understand His love for us.
- We're reconciled to God through Jesus' death. The greatest joy and contentment we can experience is in a personal relationship with the One who created us.

Scripture

Romans 5:12,18-21

12 Therefore, just as sin entered the world through one man, and death through sin, in this way death spread to all people, because all sinned. ... 18 So then, as through one trespass there is condemnation for everyone, so also through one righteous act there is justification leading to life for everyone. 19 For just as through one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so also through the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous. 20 The law came along to multiply the trespass. But where sin multiplied, grace multiplied even more 21 so that, just as sin reigned in death, so also grace will reign through righteousness, resulting in eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

- **Christianity.** You weren't good, yet God loved you anyway, even to the point of dying for you.
- **At the core of the gospel is a commitment.**
- **Accept His commitment.**

Resources

We're declared righteous by Jesus' blood. The word "righteous" means "right standing" or "right conduct." To understand the beauty of this, we have to first understand the nature of sin. God is perfectly holy and can't be in the presence of sin. The bad news is we "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23).

We're reconciled to God through Jesus' death. At the heart of the gospel, we see God reaching out to us to reconcile us to Himself. The greatest joy and contentment we can experience is in a personal relationship with the One who created us. Sin broke our relationship with God.
